

Bullying

What is bullying?

Anti-bullying advice



A definition of bullying

There is no legal definition of bullying. But it is usually defined as repeated behaviour which is intended to hurt someone either emotionally or physically, and is often aimed at certain people because of their race, religion, gender or sexual orientation or any other aspect such as appearance or disability.

Bullying can take many forms including:

- ⇒ physical assault
- ⇒ teasing
- ⇒ making threats
- ⇒ name calling



Bullying includes:

- ⇒ people calling you names
- ⇒ making things up to get you into trouble
- ⇒ hitting, pinching, biting, pushing and shoving

- ⇒ taking things away from you
- ⇒ damaging your belongings
- ⇒ stealing your money
- ⇒ taking your friends away from you
- ⇒ posting insulting messages or rumours, in person on the internet or by IM (cyberbullying)

How we prevent bullying at Stoke Fleming:

- Developing the PSHCE curriculum using SEAL materials throughout the school to develop the five 'aspects': selfawareness, managing feelings, motivation, empathy and social skills as a basis for planning.
- Online Safety taught through the Computing curriculum
- Involving the whole school community in writing and reviewing the policy.
- Circle time on bullying issues.
- Assemblies
- Raising awareness of Bullying for all stakeholders during initiatives such as Anti-Bullying Week.
- Publishing useful links on the school website focussing on anti-bullying and how to deal with bullying effectively.
- Buddy system / play leaders to support children.
- Establishing Online Safety rules and ensuring they are displayed
- Information leaflets/ Digital Parenting magazine
- Using drama activities and role play to help children become assertive in dealing with bullying situations.
- Promotion of a positive playground ethos using traditional games as a proactive strategy to anti-bullying.
- Everyone in the school community to model appropriate behaviour to each other.
- Providing Anti-Bullying training for all staff on a regular basis.

An Amazing Opportunity!

Although this opportunity is only available to those aged 16-19, we know that many of our families have older siblings who could apply and so we are circulating this information for those who may know of an eligible young person.

The Sir Francis Chichester Trust is once again offering **FREE places on the 19 day Outward Bound 'Skills for Life Award' course** to young people who live in Devon and who are aged 16-19 (at the time of the course, which will be July/August 2020).

The course is designed to help participants make an effective transition into sixth form, further education or work and is a chance to have a life-shaping adventure with people from all over the world, to know what they are truly capable of achieving and to stand out in a crowded market place. The courses are held at the Outward Bound centres in the Lake District, Wales and Scotland.

The aim of the Skills for Life Award course is that young people challenge themselves, demonstrate progress through 1:1 action planning focused on personal development, work outside of their normal friendship group and leave with a breadth of experience that will enrich personal statements and set them aside from other young people. The main benefits for the young people are seen in greatly improved self-confidence and team working abilities, together with raised aspirations.

The Trust looks for candidates that wouldn't normally have a chance to undertake anything of this nature and will be able to enjoy and benefit from the experience. Please note that we cannot support any young people that, at the time of their course, are subject to a youth offending order and also that if a young person has been supported by the Trust previously they are unlikely to be funded for a further course.

The Sir Francis Chichester Trust will meet the full course fee (£1749pp) for successful applicants and ask that they are responsible for their own transport to/from the Outward Bound centre of their choice. However, if transport costs are prohibitive then we will look at additional support if possible.

The closing date for applications is <u>Monday 3 February 2020</u> with interviews for those shortlisted being held 5 and 6 March 2020 in Exeter and young people applying must be available on one or other of these dates. **An application form can be downloaded from the Trust website <u>http://chichestertrust.org/</u> and <u>further details</u> / video clip about the course is also available. You can also download the <u>Trust's Newsletter</u> from the website and this has some feedback from young people who attended a course in 2019 and were supported by the Sir Francis Chichester Trust.**
