

Pupil Premium Report 2016-2017 - IMPACT

The Pupil Premium is additional funding for publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and close the gap between them and their peers.

For financial year 2016-17 schools were allocated additional funding to be used to support interventions and provision already in place at their schools or to provide additional provision where need was apparent.

Pupil Premium Pledges

Stoke Fleming Primary School pledges the following for all students entitled to additional support through the Pupil Premium:

- 1. To have access to the Internet at school to complete homework tasks (homework clubs).
- 2. To receive support with funding towards trips, including residential, during their time at Stoke Fleming totalling a maximum of £250.
- 3. To be given opportunities to take on additional responsibilities within the school e.g. School Council, House Captains, Playground Buddy, Peer Mentor, Lunchtime Monitor.
- 4. To be provided with extra support in Maths, English or other areas of the curriculum where the pupil is significantly underachieving.
- 5. To be provided with extra behaviour support where required.
- 6. To have access to early morning/ afterschool club free of charge (limited availability)
